6.1 The 31st ESTA International Conference: Paris, 14th - 19th April 2003

The renowned Conservatoire Supérieure de Musique, housed nowadays in an ultra-modern building in the north of the city, welcomed the European guests courtesy of the President of ESTA France, Michel Strauss, a cello professor at this venerable institution. The presentations covered topics including group tuition, physiology, music history and instrument-making. The concerts were of the obligatory high standard. A boat trip on the Seine by moonlight, with lively music from a Moldavian ensemble, delighted the participants, among whom were representatives from both Israel and Palestine.

6.2 The 32nd ESTA International Conference: Rotterdam, 16th - 21st August 2004

The conference took place in several available halls within the Doelen Concert Hall building, home of the Rotterdam Philharmonic and the Music School. It is situated in the city centre, which was rebuilt after the war. The waterfront and the port could only be seen from outside of the Conference campus or from our hotels. A reception hosted by the Mayor in the Town Hall was a social highlight, demonstrating that politics here are taking notice of music education. The programme brochure, doubling as the ESTA Netherlands journal, was of a remarkable graphic design. New Dutch music was introduced in many of the concerts, including the results of a competition in composing Caprices for solo violin. Some crossover performances were heard for the first time. Each day of the Conference began with chamber music played by pupils from the Hellendaal Music School.

The 'ESTA Students of the Year' were Swiss double bassist Thierry Rogen and Polish violinist Wojciek Plawner.

At the Delegates' meeting, after the usual agenda items (finance, organisation, etc.) had been dealt with: Kjell-Åke Hamrén (Sweden) was elected as Vice-President to succeed Elspeth Iliff (UK). Peter Esswood (UK) was elected as a new member of Central Board. After a break, ESTA Belgium was reinstated, with Mark Lambrecht as President. There is an intention to admit ESTA Israel. A representative of the Association of European Conservatoires and Music Colleges expressed the wish for closer co-operation with ESTA. Barbara Stroebel-Brack (D) reported on the sittings of the NGOs at the Council of Europe.

6.3 The 33rd ESTA International Conference: Valletta, Malta, 19th - 24th March 2005

This time, the Conference took place on the southern edge of Europe, on a Mediterranean island with a rich history marked by rule under many different nations. The Conservatoire, which was celebrating its 30th anniversary at the same time, had been founded with help from the Austrian government. The Greeks, Sicilians, Spaniards, the Order of the Knights of St John, Napoleon, the Italians under Mussolini - all have left their traces in the architecture and music of Malta. Lastly, music from around the Mediterranean was a focal point of this Conference. Concerts took place in palatial buildings.
